Common question about hunting regulations in the Village.

Hunting Areas

- Deer hunting with a rifle, handgun, or muzzleloader is not permitted on Village side (North of 40th Ave.) of the Hallie Marsh area. Shotgun and archery hunting are permitted. Deer hunting with a rifle, handgun, shotgun, or archery equipment is permitted on the Town of Hallie section (South of 40th Ave). Target shooting is only allowed on the Town of Hallie section.
- Hunting with a shotgun is allowed in the Wisconsin DNR Lands and on private property that is 40 acres or larger in size.
- Hunting with a bow or crossbow is permitted on Wisconsin DNR Lands and on any private parcel of land regardless of size. If under 40 acres, hunter must be shooting from an elevated position in a downward manner.
- Waterfowl hunting on the Chippewa River and Lake Hallie is permitted for shotgun only. The shoreline of Lake Hallie is Village or private land in which hunting/trespassing is not permitted. Hunting may be conducted from a boat or the hunter must be in the water.
- Hunting on Village property requires permission from the Village Board.
 Permission slips must be carried by the hunter which will indicate location and dates approved for.
- Kemper's Woods is open to archery hunting for turkey and deer, after the gun deer season is completed (late season archery). No other hunting or target shooting is permitted in Kemper's Woods.

Additional Regulations

- All hunters are prohibited from discharging a weapon (firearm and archery) within 100 yards of a dwelling devoted to human occupancy, unless it is their own dwelling, or carry written permission from the dwelling owner.
- Firearms and bows/crossbows do not need to be in a case to be transported in a vehicle. All firearms must be unloaded, and no arrow can be nocked or loaded on a bow or crossbow while being transported.
- Any hunting (including locating a shot deer) that uses a "drone" would be illegal as a drone is considered an "aircraft"
